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MINUTES – May 13, 2016

The meeting, held at Canandaigua Yacht Club, 3524 County Road 16, Canandaigua, NY, hosted by Ontario County, was called to order by Association President Robert Green (*Ontario*) at 10:00 a.m. P. Yendell (*Livingston*) led the Association in the Pledge of Allegiance, and A. Jackson (*Chemung*) provided the invocation.

Roll call of counties

- The following **13** counties answered roll call:
Allegany (3), Cattaraugus (4), Cayuga (1/1), Chautauqua (1), Chemung (5/1), Genesee (1), Livingston (2+1), Monroe (2), Ontario (3+2), Orleans (2), Steuben (3), Wayne (2), and Yates (1). **30 members, 7 guests in attendance.**

Welcome from Host County

Ontario County Board Chair Jack Marren welcomed everyone to the Ontario County. He introduced Mr. Brian Young, newly appointed Deputy County Administrator who is present today.

Mr. Marren reported he, along with Director David Zorn, is visiting Genesee Finger Lakes Regional Planning Council member counties this spring. It is great to learn what each county presents for ‘marketing’; parks, lakes, natural resources, as well as identifying shovel-ready areas. In speaking with various Chambers of Commerce he further identified two other relative assets; those that are manmade, and those that are natural. He closed by saying thanks for attending today.

P. Helming (*Ontario*) serves as the Supervisor for the Town of Canandaigua where the Yacht Club is located. She thanked all those who contributed to today’s event and encouraged everyone to visit Onanda Park, just down the road.

NYSAC Update

Mark LaVigne, NYSAC Deputy Director, distributed state budget impact summaries focused on information relating to individual counties. He spoke on current information regarding:

- Highlights of the Budget Impact Summaries.
- Recognize and thank senate for political statement regarding no new mandates (S3144). They understand that the decisions in the state capital have a direct impact on property taxes.
- The increase in the D.A. salaries is not huge, but it represents a mandate imposed on local governments without reimbursement. NYSAC is working with senate and assembly to pass a bill to reimburse counties for the increase. Historically the DA salary has been linked with the judges, requiring them to be equal.
- Mark LaVigne agreed that it is hard to educate our citizens when things get clouded with rhetoric from Albany. He encouraged continuing with resolutions, press releases, education campaign, continual communication with senate and assembly.

Mr. Green (*Ontario*) mentioned that the D.A. salary increase represents a 20% increase in their salaries, but at the same time the counties are being held to a lower percentage, less than 1% tax cap, at the county and town levels. Everyone is frustrated with so little ways to express ourselves.

- There are new regulations on eligibility with indigent defense services and those seeking defense. This will increase the number of people eligible placing further burden on our counties. Caseloads could double. NYSAC has sent a letter to Albany asking for minimum of delay, moving the date from October 2016 to April 2017. Related Bills are S6341-A and A6202-C.
- There are only 27 days as of this meeting in the legislative calendar.
- Bill No. A10178 relates to a public safety communications surcharges on prepaid wireless telecommunications services and to wireless surcharges in certain counties. This bill would reduce the surcharge of \$1.20 per month on 9-1-1 Public Safety on contracted cell phones and apply a lower \$1.00 per month surcharge on all devices capable of connecting to 9-1-1 as well as giving all counties the authority to apply a local surcharge dedicated solely to 9-1-1 emergency communication centers. Under current law, the State imposes a \$1.20 Public Safety Surcharge on all contracted wireless cell phones in order to fund 9-1-1 operations. Counties are burdened with necessary upgrades to 911 systems and face the challenge of meeting current communications needs while positioning themselves to be ready for future investments and demands. NYSAC continues to advocate for a greater county share of the funding collected for 911.
- Cell towers. Crown Castle is a company that can partner with counties to become landlords creating lease/license agreements for unused space on towers. Crown Castle will be at finance school next week and available to meet with counties to present this concept.

Mr. Hebert (*Monroe*) asked NYSAC to continue to supply information and data that our counties can bring to residents. He suggested executive summary type information on issues, brief and succinct.

Mark LaVigne ended by noting five affiliate organizations are holding their annual conferences this upcoming week.

M Morris (*Yates*) spoke about revisiting benchmarking with other states. (Inter County Resolution No. 20-2015, adopted June 19, 2015, entitled, "**Resolution in Support of Establishing Statewide Benchmarks for Measuring the Efficiency of State and Local Governmental Functions**"). Secretary DeMay will check with last year's secretary, Deb Liseno.

**** After checking with Deb Liseno, there has been no communication back from the Comptroller's Office since this resolution was delivered to them.**

New Business: M. Morris (*Yates*) sees our association as a powerful group, a voice for western rural counties that sometimes have no influence. Our group should be proactive and advocate for these counties.

M. Morris (*Yates*) hand-carried to the meeting Yates County Resolution No. 205-16, entitled, “Amend Res. No. 178-16, Adopt 2016 Non-Union Salary Schedule”. **Yates County resolves: ‘that effective April 1, 2016, the Yates County District Attorney’s salary be increased from \$152,000 to \$183,400 upon being advised that New York State will reimburse Yates County for the DA Salary increase.....’.** Yates County has decided to go one step further than simply protesting the unfunded mandate of increased salary for the District Attorney. Other counties expressed frustration and some have considered the same. Mr. Morris realizes this is a late file document for this association’s consideration and is not requesting action today. R. Green (*Ontario*) stated Ontario County was crushed by the Appellate Division in 1982 in *Harvey v. Finnick*. Ontario had to pay all back-pay on that decision.

Presentation/Program:

P. Helming (*Ontario*) introduced Mr. Kevin Olvany, the Canandaigua Lake Watershed Manager. Mr. Olvany presented and informative slide show on protecting our water. He reported that over 70,000 people rely on Canandaigua Lake for drinking water. He reviewed the watershed plan which covers protection, restoration of critical areas such as wetlands, shorelines, floodplains, and stormwater runoff to mention a few. As part of his presentation he offered information on blue-green algae. Certain blue-green algal species have strains capable of producing toxins, posing a risk to humans, pets, and wildlife. The Association thanked Mr. Olvany for his presentation.

**TITLE: MEMORIALIZING THE GOVERNOR AND STATE LEGISLATURE IN SUPPORT OF
BILL NO. S07209, ALLOWING FOR FLEXIBILITY IN OFF-HOUR ARRAIGNMENTS
AT LOCAL COURTS.**

WHEREAS, the State's settlement of the *Hurrell-Harring* suit identified the presence of counsel at arraignments as a priority for the indigent defense system in New York; and

WHEREAS, with the vast geography and number of local courts in counties such as Steuben, makes achieving this goal, specifically in off-hours, unduly operationally and fiscally burdensome; and

WHEREAS, the New York State Senate has introduced Bill No. S07209, which broadens the jurisdiction of local courts to conduct off-hours arraignments in a few select locations, potentially on a rotating basis; and

WHEREAS, this bill would allow the County to partner with the County Magistrate's Association; County Bar Association and others to develop a plan that would improve the efficiency of arraignments.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, that the Steuben County Legislature calls upon the Governor and State Legislature to support Bill No. S07209 and enact this legislation prior to the close of the current legislative session; and

Pursuant to Section 450 of the County Law.

I. WHEREAS, the New York State Defenders Association (NYSDA) has long recognized the important role of standards in improving public defense representation by using and publicizing a wide variety of national and state standards in many contexts; adopting "Standards for Providing Constitutionally and Statutorily Mandated Legal Representation in New York State" in 2004 and its Client Advisory Board's "Client-Centered Representation Standards" in 2005; and commenting on drafts or otherwise assisting in standards developed by other organizations, including the New York State Bar Association, the American Bar Association, and the New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services (ILS), and

II. WHEREAS, in 2015, ILS was designated by the State of New York to implement the settlement of the class action lawsuit *Hurrell-Harring v State of New York*, and as part of fulfilling that responsibility undertook its own comprehensive examination of eligibility processes across the State, and

III. WHEREAS, ILS then developed, with the assistance of NYSDA and others, and has now promulgated "Criteria and Procedures for Determining Assigned Counsel Eligibility" consistent with the agreed-upon terms of the *Hurrell-Harring* settlement relating to eligibility determinations and pursuant to its authority under Executive Law § 832(3)(c), and

IV. WHEREAS, implementation of those ILS standards to guide courts in determining eligibility will improve the fairness and efficiency of eligibility determinations across the State, benefitting potential public defense clients, the judiciary, and justice, now, therefore, be it

I. RESOLVED, that the Cattaraugus County Legislature hereby fully endorses the "Criteria and Procedures for Determining Assigned Counsel Eligibility" promulgated by ILS on April 4, 2016 and the extension of the effective date to April 1, 2017, as requested by the Chief Defenders Association of New York, and be it further

II. RESOLVED, that a copy of this resolution be sent to Governor Cuomo, Senate Majority Leader Flanagan, Senator Young, Assembly Speaker Heastie, Assemblyman Giglio, and the New York State Office of Indigent Legal Services (ILS), the New York State Defenders Association (NYSDA), the New York Civil Liberties Union (NYCLU), the Chief Defenders Association of New York (CDANY), the New York Association of Counties (NYSAC), and the Inter-County Association of Western New York.

URGING GOVERNOR CUOMO AND STATE LEGISLATURE TO FULLY REIMBURSE MUNICIPAL SELF-INSURED WORKERS' COMPENSATION PLANS

Pursuant to Section 153 of the County Law.

I. WHEREAS, Senate Bill S03891 and Assembly Bill A05518 propose to amend the Volunteer Firefighters' Benefit Law, in relation to the expansion of coverage to include cancer of the digestive, hematological, lymphatic, urinary, prostate, neurological, breast and reproductive systems, and

II. WHEREAS, the New York State Association of Self-Insured Counties (NYSASIC), as the professional organization representing the majority of self-insured counties and many other municipalities in the State of New York, strongly opposes this legislation, and

III. WHEREAS, the proposed legislation provides that in the event that an individual passes his or her physical examination on entry into firefighter service that any melanoma or other cancer condition that is subsequently diagnosed is presumed to arise in the performance and discharge of that individual's duties as a volunteer firefighter, and

IV. WHEREAS, this legislation is problematic for several reasons, including the following:

- most physical examinations required for entry into a volunteer fire department are quite limited in scope and do not include the detail or the diagnostic testing typically associated with diagnosing cancer or ruling out the presence of cancer,
- many of the conditions may be present and remain undiagnosed even though an individual may still pass the physical examination associated for entry into firefighter service,
- many of the conditions identified often develop with age and/or are either genetic or hereditary in nature, and
- even if a comprehensive physical examination with diagnostic testing is performed when an individual first enters firefighter service, it would be both disingenuous and unwise to presume that in the event that such an individual eventually is diagnosed with cancer, such as prostate cancer or breast cancer many years later, that the development or cause of that cancer is in any way connected to the individual's firefighter service,

and

V. WHEREAS, such legislation would essentially place counties in the position of insuring that, in the event that a volunteer firefighter contracts cancer of any kind, they will need to provide indemnity, medical and, potentially, death benefits, unless they can prove that such cancer condition is unrelated with competent evidence, and

VI. WHEREAS, providing such a presumption and placing the cost of rebutting such a presumption on county taxpayers would pose an undue financial burden and hardship, and

VII. WHEREAS, such a presumption would also likely force counties and volunteer fire

departments to change their procedures relating to physical examinations for volunteer firefighters in order to ensure that applicants are cancer free resulting in comprehensive physical examinations that would prove costly and could have a chilling effect on recruitment and the membership of volunteer fire departments, and

VIII. WHEREAS, the legislation proposed by Senate Bill S03891 and Assembly Bill A05518 is unnecessary as the Volunteer Firefighters' Benefits Law already provides such benefits in the event that a volunteer firefighter (or his or her dependents in connection with a death claim) can prove that the cancer condition arose in the line of duty, and

IX. WHEREAS, shifting the burden of proof based upon a flawed presumption that has no medical basis would be ill advised, now, therefore, be it

I. RESOLVED, that the Cattaraugus County Legislature urges the State of New York not to pass Senate Bill S03891 and Assembly Bill A05518 in its current language, and be it further

II. RESOLVED, that the Cattaraugus County Legislature hereby urges modification of Senate Bill S03891 and Assembly Bill A05518, prior to enactment, to provide that municipal self-insured workers' compensation plans be reimbursed by the State of New York, the costs of all claims associated with such legislation, and be it further

II. RESOLVED, that the Clerk of the Legislature is hereby directed to forward copies of this resolution to Governor Andrew M. Cuomo, Senate Majority Leader Flanagan, Assembly Speaker Heastie, Senator Young, Assembly Member Giglio, the New York State Association of Counties, the Western New York Inter-County Association, and the New York State Association of Self-Insured Counties.

RESOLUTION NO. 389-2016

RESOLUTION OF SUPPORT OF PROPOSED PAINT STEWARDSHIP PROGRAM NEW YORK STATE SENATE BILL 4926C AND ASSEMBLY BILL 6199C

WHEREAS, It is estimated that New York State residents purchase over 39.2 million gallons of paint annually; and

WHEREAS, The United States Environmental Protection Agency estimates that ten percent of all paint purchased by consumers goes unused; and

WHEREAS, New York State municipalities spend an estimated \$3.1 million on paint management costs annually; and

WHEREAS, Bills S.4926C and A.6199C would establish a paint stewardship program aimed at minimizing the public sector's involvement in the management of post-consumer paint; and

WHEREAS, Said bills also detail agreements for the collection, transportation, reuse, recycling and/or environmentally sound disposal of post-consumer paint, and

WHEREAS, The programs detailed within the bills will be funded through fees paid by the producers/manufacturers of the product and the consumers through a paint stewardship assessment fee paid at the time of purchase; and

WHEREAS, A version of said bills was passed unanimously by the New York State Senate last year; and
